

## **SITUATION OVERVIEW**

The weather pattern of seasonal temperatures with scattered showers and occasional thunder showers will give way to cooler temperatures for the next few days. Rivers levels remain high but are dropping slowly in most regions of the province. No new flooding incidents were reported in the past 3 days.

Over the weekend a significant rain event moved into the south-central region of the province, bringing heavy rain to some areas. Most of the rest of the province did not see any amount of rain. Some streams and rivers produced new peaks due to the rain, however none reached flood levels. Those rivers and now receding.

The South Thompson River continues to rise slowly as expected.

The Provincial Emergency Program PREOC's and the PECC in Victoria continue to work with local governments to monitor and support as required.

## **OUTLOOK**

The flooding situation is generally continuing to improve across most of the province. The 5 day forecast is indicating below normal temperatures across most of the province for the middle of the week, with a return to seasonal temperatures by the end of the week. There is currently no significant rain in the forecast for any region. The outlook for the next 3 to 5 days is for a continuing decline in flood risk over most of the province.

Streams and rivers across the province are generally receding at this time. The South Thompson River is continuing to rise slowly, however this is an expected pattern for this river.

The situation on the Liard River in the far north of the province is currently unknown as the data station is out of service. There have been no reports of flooding concerns over the weekend.

As there are currently no flooding issues to report, and as streams and rivers are expected to continue to drop now for the next several days, this will be the final situation report at this time. The River Forecast Centre and the Provincial Emergency Program will continue to monitor the flood risk and will issue situation reports as required.
