### **Summer 2006 Fire Season Situation Overview – July 5, 2006; 1030 hrs**

#### **Northeast Region**

The Northeast Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centre continues to be activated to support local authorities and coordinate provincial ministries and agencies. There are three open Emergency Operations Centres (Dawson Creek, Tumbler Ridge, Williams Lake), and three Reception Centres (Chetwynd, Dawson Creek, Quesnel). A total of three Evacuation Orders and five Evacuation Alerts have been issued (see below).

##### **Peace River Regional District (PRRD)**

A declaration of a State of Local Emergency remains in effect, and the PRRD Emergency Operations Centre located in Dawson Creek remains activated.

##### **District of Tumbler Ridge**

A declaration of a State of Local Emergency and an Evacuation Order issued July 3<sup>rd</sup> remains in effect, and the Emergency Operations Centre in Tumbler Ridge remains activated.

Approximately 3,500 residents have evacuated the area. Over 1,100 people have registered at Chetwynd's Reception Centre for Emergency Social Services. Approximately 100 residents have registered in Dawson Creek. Many more are staying in group and commercial lodging in both communities.

Highways 52 and 29 in the district are closed to public access, with the exception of some restricted access for industrial activity.

##### **Alaska Highway**

The Alaska Highway has been reopened between Fort St. John (kilometre 101) and Pink Mountain (kilometre 226). There are three other fires along the Alaska Highway that *may* cause road closures at Trutch (Mile 202), Mile 91 and Tommy Lakes (Mile 115).

##### **Wonowon**

An Evacuation Alert has been issued to some fifty households affecting approximately 200 people.

##### **Cariboo Regional District**

The Cariboo Regional District declared a State of Local Emergency on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 2006, and the Emergency Operations Centre in Williams Lake remains activated.

##### **Wultus Lake (west of Quesnel)**

Wultus Lake is under an Evacuation Order as of July 4<sup>th</sup>, 19:15 hrs.

#### Ahahim & Nimpo Lakes (West Chilcotin)

The Ministry of Forests continues to apply resources to contain several fires in the area. Residents have been placed on Evacuation Alert.

#### Tezla Lake

Tezla Lake is under an Evacuation Order as of July 4<sup>th</sup>, 19:15 hrs. Highway 59 east of the Nazko community is closed due to impacts from a forest fire.

The Nazko Indian Band has voluntarily evacuated the community of Nazko (west of Quesnel) due to smoke issues. The City of Quesnel has opened a Reception Centre to receive an estimated 160 people from the Nazko Indian Band.

Eleven guests from a lodge near Tezla Lake have been evacuated, in addition to one resident previously evacuated by the Ministry of Forests.

#### Tsacha Lake

Residents of Tsacha Lake have been placed on Evacuation Alert.

### **Central Region**

The Central Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centre remains activated to support local authorities and coordinate provincial ministries and agencies.

#### Thompson-Nicola Regional District

The Thompson-Nicola Regional District Emergency Operations Centre remains activated as of July 4<sup>th</sup>, 2006.

#### Chuwels Mountain (18 km southwest of Kamloops)

A fire in the Chuwels Mountain area has led to the closure of 2 recreational sites.

### **Definitions**

#### **Evacuations**

**Evacuation Alert:** Local authorities issue a warning in the form of an Evacuation Alert about an imminent threat to life and property, and people are asked to be ready to leave on short notice. When people choose to leave an area before or during the issuing of an alert, this is referred to as a voluntary evacuation.

**Evacuation Order:** Local authorities issue an Evacuation Order when the population is determined to be at imminent risk, and people must leave the area immediately. Local police or RCMP enforce Evacuation Orders.

**Evacuation Rescind:** An Evacuation Order or Alert is rescinded or lifted by local authorities when it is determined to be safe for residents to return home. An Evacuation Order may be reinstated if a threat returns.
